On behalf of the Omicron Association, Inc. BOD, I want to send a sincere and heartfelt thank you to all who have worked on and contributed generously to Omicron's Capital Campaign: *Preserving Our Tradition, Building Our Future.* I want to send particular gratitude to **Bob Kaiser** '74 who was the campaign chair, along with **David Lapinski** '74, **Chris Nesselrode** '95, and all members of the Campaign Committee and class agents.

We did not meet all of our ambitious goals, but thanks to your support, we have many successes to be proud of. Of the \$285,200 pledged, we collected \$233,204.77 from 54 donors. 

GIVING BACK

Mark Toniatti '70 Gives Back Time and Talent to Penn **State Students Entering the Professional World**

We recently caught up with Mark Toniatti '70 on his way into his daughter's wedding rehearsal.

Toniatti, a 1973 graduate, has had a lively and prosperous career. Having first joined a management consulting company, Toniatti went on to work with Towers Perrin (now Towers Watson) in the actuarial benefits department (a field analyzing risk and giving businesses an idea of how much it would cost to insure against that risk), where he remained for 37 years, eventually retiring from the actuarial field.

"Here's the bottom line: study and get outstanding grades; most companies will not look at people without good grades."

Using his wealth of knowledge and experience, Toniatti now lends his time and talent to undergraduates of Phi Kappa Tau, actuarial science, and accounting sciences. He volunteers as a guest speaker to a variety of oncampus groups. Most recently, Toniatti gave a presentation on November 13, 2014 on evaluating job offers. Hosted by the Penn State Actuarial Science Club, the lecture focused on the importance of using an interview as an opportunity to vet out and actively choose an employer.

Toniatti is a retired actuary with much to

offer to hopeful young undergrads.

"Well, when I retired five years ago after being in the benefits field my entire career, this new [volunteer] role gave me an opportunity to continue to mentor and interact with students. It also certainly doesn't hurt that it keeps me active and busy in my retirement. I also volunteer with the university and for various organizations around the university."

With all of his life experience and current work with undergraduates from various backgrounds and fields, Toniatti's best advice rings true for every Penn State grad:

"Here's the bottom line: study and get outstanding grades. Most companies will not look at people without good grades." Toniatti also noted that during his time in the field he interviewed and recruited many students from Penn State. Clearly, he is familiar with the students and with the hiring process. It is just a fact, he says, "in the resumes that we receive, we weed out the ones with bad grades."

Perhaps what Mark Toniatti is saying, as an actuary, is this: if you are well-equipped and disciplined, you will never encounter risk in a job interview. Use the opportunity of an interview to get to know the company and determine if this is a good match for you. Preparing students for the realities of working in the field and finding a good work environment is Toniatti's way of giving back.
